National Council of LA RAZA

National Council of La Raza (NCLR) Mujer Sana, Familia Fuerte (Healthy Woman, Strong Family) project addresses the need for effective cervical cancer education for Latinas. Mujer Sana, Familia Fuerte is a culturally competent and linguistically appropriate community-based program with the goal of increasing the percentage of Latinas who receive Pap tests in Chicago and Washington, D.C. The objectives of the project are to increase knowledge, change attitudes, increase behavioral intent, and change behavior regarding cervical cancer screening among Spanish-speaking Latinas.
